

Meth dealer gets 50 months in plea deal

A local meth distributor arrested last year during an investigation by the Basin Interagency Narcotics Enforcement Team has been sentenced to more than four years in prison after pleading guilty to numerous drug charges.

Richard Dean Carpenter, 49, of Klamath Falls, was sentenced Feb. 7 to 50 months in prison after pleading guilty Feb. 1 to eight felony counts including possession of methamphetamine, delivery of methamphetamine, delivery of methamphetamine within 1,000 feet of a school, delivery of an imitation controlled substance and felon in possession of a restricted weapon.

If Carpenter had gone to trial, he faced up to 20 years in prison on his highest count. Court records showed Carpenter's 50-month sentence was greater than would normally be imposed given his criminal history due to the defendant's "persistent involvement" in similar offenses.

Carpenter was arrested May 26, 2016, after mak-

ing two drug deliveries to undercover officers earlier that month. One officer was sold a gram of methamphetamine for \$65 and a second officer was sold an ounce of methylsulfonylmethane, a dietary supplement ingredient police described as "faked methamphetamine," for \$400.

While released on these charges, Carpenter was charged again Nov. 19, 2016, for possessing methamphetamine and possessing a large knife, which Carpenter was prohibited from carrying due to a previous felony burglary conviction.

In addition to local charges, Carpenter is the subject of a felony methamphetamine and theft warrant out of Benton County, Wash., and extradition proceedings are currently pending.

Carpenter is also the plaintiff in a \$250,000 lawsuit against the Klamath County Jail and, as of Monday, the case was still pending. Carpenter claims the jail was responsible when he was assaulted by another inmate and he is seeking damages for current and future medical expenses.

PORTLAND (AP) — Portland officials say they have begun delivering water to residents from a second source after repeatedly finding trace amounts of cryptosporidium parasite in drinking water.

The Portland Water Bureau said in a news release Monday that while it was not required the bureau has stopped using the Bull Run watershed out of an abundance of caution.

As of Monday, water to the city is coming from the Columbia South Shore Well Field, which officials say meets or surpasses all federal and state drinking water regulations.

Remains identified as missing Yreka man

YREKA — The Siskiyou County Sheriff's Office has confirmed the remains of a man found near Red Bluff, Calif., last month belong to Trygve "Karl" Larson, who went missing four weeks ago.

On Friday the sheriff's office confirmed Larson's remains were positively identified after a fin-

gerprint analysis by the California Department of Justice. An autopsy confirmed there was no evidence of criminal wrongdoing and authorities believe the deceased had been in the water for several days before his recovery from the Sacramento River.

Larson, 79, of Yreka, was last seen by relatives Jan. 16 and was believed to be en-

dangered due to "various factors," though authorities have not detailed the nature of these concerns. Search efforts were concentrated near Greenhorn Park, south of Yreka, but Larson was recovered more than 100 miles away Jan. 26 by the Tehama County Sheriff's Office.

Siskiyou County Sheriff Jon Lopey credited the diligent work of search and res-

cue teams and Tehama County in the recovery of Larson's remains.

"On behalf of the Siskiyou County Sheriff's Office, I would like to extend our thoughts and prayers to Mr. Larson and his many family members and friends," said Lopey.

Larson's disappearance remains under investigation and those with information are encouraged to contact Siskiyou County emergency dispatch at 530-841-2900.

Woman sues for \$3.25 million after injury from dogs

A Klamath Falls woman has sued a local resident for \$3.25 million for injuries sustained after allegedly being tripped by one of the defendant's dogs.

Carol Arnold filed suit Wednesday in Klamath County Circuit Court against Margaret Bailey for an incident June 26, 2015, at Arnold's residence on the 1200 block of Buck Island Drive, next to Moore Park.

Arnold claims two dogs belonging to Bailey, described as pit bulls, ran up to Arnold while unattended outside the plaintiff's house.

"One wrapped their leash around plaintiff and jumped on her, causing her to fall," said the suit.

Arnold claims she suffered injuries including a broken right hip, a broken right leg, necrosis in the bones of her left shoulder resulting in joint replacement, and other recurring injuries. She cited nine surgeries and two minor medi-

cal procedures required since the incident, the most recent on Dec. 3, 2016, at Oregon Health and Science University, in Portland.

Arnold is seeking \$1.75 million in medical expenses and economic damages as well as \$1.5 million for pain and suffering. Arnold is represented by Medford-based attorney Ryan Vanderhoof. As of Monday, court records showed Bailey had yet to be served with notice of the suit.

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
