

# 4-Day Missionary Conference Set for North New Salem

**NORTH NEW SALEM**—A four-day Missionary Conference is to be held at the North New Salem Congregational Church starting on Thursday evening, September 24, and continuing through Sunday, the 27th.

The missionary speakers will be Mr. and Mrs. David E. A. Thomson from West Pakistan and meetings will be held on each of four evenings at 7:30. The Evangelical Alliance Mission, known as "TEAM", has about 50 missionaries now serving in West Pakistan where they are engaged in medical, educational and evangelical ministries.

Mr. Thomson is working with TEAM as a supervisor of construction and his wife is a nurse. He is bringing a sound motion picture and slides to show here.

At the Thursday evening meeting Mr. Thomson's subject will be "Why Missions?" And on Friday evening he will show slides.

On Saturday the local church will be host for the Connecticut Valley Youth Rally, when young people from other churches in this area are especially invited to attend. For the Rally Mr. Thomson will show a film called "The Harvesters" and his message is entitled "Ambition."

Other weekday features of the conference will be a Women's Luncheon at noon Friday when Mrs. Thomson will speak; on Saturday morning at 7 a Men's Breakfast is to be served by the men themselves and Mr. Thomson will speak on "Missionary Call." Food is being solicited but a charge of fifty cents is being made to cover the cost of the men's breakfast. Reservations for the luncheon and breakfast should be made in advance with

the pastor, Rev. Richard Seawright.

On Sunday, the 27th, there will be a full day's program beginning at 9:15 a.m. when the annual "Promotion Day" service of the Sunday School will take the place of the regular class session and all the departments will meet together in the church sanctuary. Mrs. Richard Seawright is the superintendent and will present promotion certificates to children who are being promoted to next higher classes. The children are inviting parents and friends to attend this service and the person bringing the most people is to receive a prize. An attendance of over 100 is hoped for. Mr. Thomson will speak to the Sunday School on "The Digging of Wells."

At the morning worship service at the church on Sunday at 10:30 Mr. Thomson will speak on "Our Lord's Resurrection Ministry" and the church choir will sing.

At 3 o'clock on Sunday afternoon there will be a dedicatory organ recital with the church organist, Miss Elsa W. Stone of Templeton, at the organ. This service is a dedication of a beautiful, full size electronic church organ which was presented to the North New Salem Church last year and installed in the sanctuary.

Mrs. Ruth Davis of North Orange, who was a guest at the first fall meeting of the Women's Christian Service Society at the North New Salem church last week, presented an interesting musical program giving the history of well known Gospel hymns and playing the tunes on an accordion, an autoharp or on a recorder. Some of the hymns were

sung by those present accompanied by Miss Elsa Stone on the Bullard Memorial Organ.

More than twenty people from the local church went to Boston by chartered bus Friday evening to attend the opening meeting of the Billy Graham Crusade which is being held at Boston Garden. Other people from Orange made up a full busload. Nearly 80 people, including some from Athol, Orange, Wendell and Leverett, attended the evening service at the North New Salem Church on Sunday, the 20th, when a film of a Billy Graham Crusade in Chicago was shown.

Rev. Richard Seawright showed the same film at the 2 o'clock service for the patients at the Fleetwood Nursing Home in Athol.

Several from New Salem attended the Athol Historical Society's "Neighborhood Night" held at their Historical Building in Athol Saturday evening.
